The Academic Tribe is like a herd of Verbal Turtles

It tries diligently to understand the world, but it moves very slowly and talks constantly.

- It is very Disorganized
- It is Under Funded
- It excels in Collaboration, Networking
- **Byzantine Politics prevail**
- Centers of Excellence are embedded in a Sea of Mediocrity
- Rewards are Highly Skewed to favor Noise over slower, high Quality Work
- Separating wisdom from noise is hard
- Interdiscipline and long term are weak

Some Data on the Academic Tribe

Colleges of all kinds, USA = 4 182

All Colleges Worldwide => 12 000

Universities in the World = 6.452

Faculty and Prof. Staff, USA = 2.9 million, of whom about 1.25 million are teachers of one kind or another

Students at USA colleges = 14.8 million (1999), 15.8 million (2003)

Students at world colleges = ~88 million (1997)

Area Studies* grads, USA = 6,381 (2000) *[includes ethnic studies]

Language program grads, = 14,968 (2000) [75% of 1970 level]

Total Budgets, US colleges = \$ 221 billion in 1997

[~ 60% public, 40% private] \$ 277 billion in 2001

Very Rough Estimates of Annual Expenditures on "Intelligence"

- \$ 30 billion, US Nat.Sec. Intelligence community
- \$ 30 billion, non-US intelligence community
- 7 billion, SCIP-like business intelligence, US
- \$ 277 billion, all American colleges, 2001
- \$ 344 billion, Total

Ratio, US nat.sec. IC investments to total = 60/344 = 17%

<u>Very</u> Rough Estimates of Personnel in the Official Intelligence and Academic Sectors

25,000 CIA
250,000 whole US intelligence community
1,250,000 whole US higher education community
1,500,000 Total

Ratio of national security to all intelligence professionals, USA = 250,000 / 1,500,000 = 16.6% [NB: NGO & Media]

17.4% and 16.6% are not significantly different

First Order Conclusion =

The Academic World is about 6 times the size of the Official Intelligence World.

NB: This completely ignores the NGO and Media Tribes



And why would that be?



Plus he has no parriers to talking with them. So correcting errors is easier.
